Pipe Cleaner Easter Flowers

Pastel Tulips, Egg-Nest Daisies & a Mini Spring Wreath — No Glue

What You Need

Materials

- Pastel pipe cleaners — soft pink, lilac, mint green, baby blue, pale yellow
- White pipe cleaners — for daisy petals and accents
- Green pipe cleaners — for stems and leaves
- A small basket, egg carton, or nest of dried grass/moss
- Small craft eggs or pom-poms (optional)
- A twig or grapevine wreath base (for the wreath design)

Total cost: \$2–5 · Time: 5–7 minutes per flower

3 Easter Designs

1. The Pastel Tulip

- 1 Fold a pastel pipe cleaner in half, then twist the top third into a rounded loop — one tulip petal.
- 2 Repeat with 2 more pastel pipe cleaners, twisting all 3 loops together at the base.
- 3 Gently pinch each petal loop at the top for the classic tulip point.
- 4 Twist a green pipe cleaner around the base to form the stem, add a folded leaf halfway down.

2. The Egg-Nest Daisy

- 1 Fold a white pipe cleaner in half, twist small loops (~3 cm) along its length — use 2-3 pipe cleaners for a full ring.
- 2 Arrange into a ring and twist the bases together at one central point.
- 3 Coil a small pastel yellow or pink piece into a flat spiral and attach it in the middle.
- 4 Keep the stem short and nestle the daisy into a basket or nest alongside mini craft eggs.

3. The Mini Easter Wreath

- 1 Make 5-7 small flowers (mix of pastel tulips and daisies) at a mini scale.
- 2 Attach each flower to a small twig or grapevine wreath base by twisting the stem around it.
- 3 Space evenly, alternating colors, fill gaps with small folded green leaves.
- 4 Optional: tie a pastel ribbon bow at the top or bottom.

Good to know: Pipe cleaner flowers don't wilt — make your whole Easter display weeks in advance.

Easter Color Palettes to Try

Classic Pastel — soft pink + lilac + mint green + pale yellow

Spring Garden — white + yellow + light green

Blush & Gold — blush pink + cream + a touch of gold for centers

Bright & Playful (for kids) — turquoise + orange + hot pink

Where to Display Your Easter Flowers

Table Centerpiece

5-7 tulips in a small pastel vase or teapot.

Egg-Nest Basket

Daisies nestled among craft eggs in a woven basket.

Front Door Wreath

The mini wreath design, hung with a pastel ribbon.

Place Setting Accent

One small flower tied to each napkin or place card.

Tips for a Fresh Springtime Look



Stick to soft, muted pastels for an elegant look — save bright colors for a kids' version.



Mix flower types — a few tulips, a few daisies, and plain green leaves looks more natural.

Vary stem lengths in any arrangement — uniform heights look flat.

For the wreath, use a smaller base (20-25 cm) so mini flowers don't look lost.

FAQ

Can I make these without glue?

Yes — every design, including the wreath assembly, is done purely by twisting.

Are these safe for kids to make?

Yes, the daisy and tulip suit ages 5+ with light supervision — a classic Easter classroom activity.

How far in advance can I make these?

Pipe cleaner flowers don't wilt or fade, so you can make your whole display weeks ahead.
